According to Nadine Shannon, Task Force chairperson, there are 21 support congregations for Congregations for the Homeless, which provides shelter and social services to homeless men. In the first year of the program, which began in September, 1993, 151 persons were housed, of whom 60 have moved into permanent housing. The average stay is 12 nights, and about 12 men are housed each night at an Eastside congregation. Host congregations provide facilities for a month, and are assisted by support congregations with financial and volunteer support.
