Services are free or low cost depending on family eligibility.

Congregations For The Homeless

Regular meeting: 1st Tuesday, 12 noon to 1 p.m. St. Luke's Lutheran Church - 3030 Bellevue Way NE, Bellevue

This program will celebrate its tenth anniversary in September, 2003. It provides safe secure shelter, three meals daily, and employment assistance for homeless men on the Eastside, to return them to being members of the community. Host congregations, who provide facilities for a month, are assisted by support congregations and other agencies and individuals who provide financial and volunteer support. A total of 67 congregations currently participate. The cities of Bellevue, Issaquah, Kirkland, and Redmond, and United Way have provided grants for our services. Services by 3108 volunteers enable 99% of the income to be used for direct services.

Currently there are between 15 and 22 men in the shelter each night. Clients' average age is

This agency, a service of Harborview Hospital, serves children who have been abused, as well as those who have observed other traumatic events, and family members, and provides medical and legal advocacy and educational programs as well as clinical services.

between 34 and 55, older than the previously reported 22 to 34. Clients must be at least 18, and occasionally one is 75. Clients typically have good employment skills, but struggle in a difficult job market in which many are unemployed.

We contract with Catholic Community Services to provide counseling as needed and employment case management. There is always one site manager at the host congregation with the clients. Sleeping facilities at the host congregation and three meals daily are provided pro bono by volunteers.

Hopelink

The Bellevue office of Hopelink provides services in their family development center and food bank. Non-perishable food is welcomed for weekly food banks. Other services include programs for senior citizens and people with disabilities, and a day care center for children.

Children whose families cannot afford lunch are provided with free and reduced lunches during the school year, and the "Brown Bag Lunch Brigade" in the summer.

Also part of Hopelink is RotaCare Clinic, a free walk-in medical clinic offered Saturdays (except in August) from 9:30—11:30 a.m. The clinic, sponsored by Eastside Rotarians, is staffed by two volunteer physicians, and works with social service agencies to provide follow up care and care for chronic illness. Volunteers also include social workers and interpreters.

The Family Development Program assists low-income families to set and accomplish goals, through identifying their strengths and goals. The program provides emergency services, life skills workshops, parenting classes and support groups, and ongoing support and advocacy. Families learn to achieve success in such areas as nutrition, employment, physical and emotional health, and family and social relations. Information: (425) 943-7550.
