

This agency, a service of Harborview Hospital, serves children who have been abused, as well as those who have observed other traumatic events, and family members, and provides medical and legal advocacy and educational programs as well as group and individual counseling.

The agency's vision is for all children to have a safe and nurturing environment, a home and community free of sexual assault and other trauma and the pain and disruption these cause.
